Berit Hafsmo lives around the poverty limit in Trondheim, Norway's third-largest city. Despite constant adversity, however, she is a worldclass optimist. Things are looking up when she is granted a council flat in Skitbyen (literally "Shit Town"), nicknamed for the city sanitation workers who were the original tenants a hundred years ago. She turns her flat into a safe haven for friends and family who find themselves in equally dire straits. But now eviction is looming. Berit has fought the system before-and lost-so she finds no reason for despair. When life slaps her in the face, she finds all the more reason for creative and positive thinking.

Story of A. - life, dreams and struggles of unaccompanied and separated children in Italy

A four-part podcast telling the story of Abdul, who in 2017 arrived in Italy as an unaccompanied child from the Ivory Coast. He was only 14. The episodes, narrated by him, follow his story from his arrival in Italy to his inclusion in the reception system, with all of the dreams and challenges he faced along the way. Abdul's story is intertwined with those of the people in Italy who supported him, such as one of his teachers and a family who took him in through the 'Terreferme' family foster care pathway. This pathway has been run by UNICEF and the Coordinamento Nazionale Comunità d'Accoglienza (CNCA) since 2017 to promote family-based care for migrant and refugee children and adolescents who have arrived in Italy alone.

The story captured the attention of the BBC Journalist Sue Mitchell, as it was unfolding on her street. She spends a lot of time in California – she married an American and her award-winning journalism has been about the lives of people like Dave who inhabit the dangerous margins of society.
